

It is with great joy and excitement that I am able to share with you the new Children's Ministry curriculum that will be utilized beginning in October: Godly Play.





will allow approximately 30 minutes for the children to engage in Christian Education programming.

In order to lay a strong foundation upon which children can build and layer their understanding, analysis, and synthesis, we must start with the teaching of "the basics" – the central stories of the Christian faith, and a general understanding of liturgical practices. These stories and practices define who we are as Christians, and Episcopalians, and act as reminders that we are all a part of the on-going Christian narrative. By presenting Bible stories and liturgical action in a format that is both engaging and fun, children will learn these stories and practices by heart, creating a firm foundation on which they can build a deeper understanding of what it means to be a Christian in their hearts, in their lives, and within the larger context of our diverse world.

Godly Play is a Montessori-based Christian Education curriculum that uses play and wondering as the basis of learning and growing in faith. The following are a few brief excerpts from the Godly Play website (godlyplayfoundation.org) that can hopefully provide a clearer theological and educational understanding of the curriculum:

Godly Play Mission Statement: Making meaning through story, wonder, and play. Nurturing spiritual lives by honoring the centrality, competency, and capacity of children. Godly Play® method is a curriculum of spiritual practice exploring the mystery of God's presence in our lives. The Godly Play curriculum engages what is most exciting about religious education: God inviting us into—and pursuing us in the midst of—Scripture and spiritual experience. Godly Play® practice teaches us to listen for God and to make authentic and creative responses to God's call in our lives.

- Godly Play is a creative, imaginative approach to Christian formation and spiritual guidance.
- ♦ Godly Play has a Montessori foundation with 40+ years of research and practice.
- ♦ Godly Play values process, openness, discovery, community and relationships.
- ♦ Godly Play models the worship life, stories, symbols and rituals of Christian congregations.
- Godly Play allows practitioners to make relevant and personal theological meaning.

• Godly Play nurtures participants to larger dimensions of belief and faith through wondering and play.

Each week the children will hear a bible story, or story explaining our liturgical actions as an Episcopal community, told/presented by a "storyteller" via scripts and "stories" (props and pieces) purchased from the Godly Play Foundation. Following the story, children will have the opportunity to utilize a wide variety of art supplies in order to create something that reflects, or responds to, the story they just heard. The opportunities for this creative work are endless, and its relation to the story can be as tight or as loose as the child wishes. The point is not the outcome of creation, but the creative process of thinking about the story, making connections, and reflecting those connections in a creative way.

With differentiated learning in mind, children who do not respond well to open-ended creative expression will be given the opportunity to explore the story in other ways – for example, by writing a narrative or graphic novel based on the day's story, journaling about the story, or making a list of questions the story raises, or utilizing research materials in order to gather more information about the story (Who are the characters? Where did the story happen? What book is it from and why does that matter?). Again, the point is not necessarily what is created during work time, but rather how the children engage with the story in their own, unique way.

Once children have moved through the Godly Play curriculum, the goal is they will possess a strong foundation in their faith, Episcopal liturgical practices, and know most (if not all) of it by heart. This is not memorization, but rather exposure to the stories and practices of the Christian faith and Episcopal tradition that results in an absorption of these elements into the child's very being. This organic learning will allow children to seamlessly transition from the children's program into to the tween and eventually teen programs where higher-order thinking about faith is introduced and fostered.

In the Fall, I will offer a "mock Godly Play session" at 9:00 am before worship, so that parents and children can experience a class together. Although this class is designed specifically for participants and their parents, all those interested are welcome to attend! I hope that experiencing this wonderful curriculum in action will give everyone a clearer understanding of what the children will be participating in week-in and week-out.

Of course, these programs cannot occur without volunteers – storytellers and "helpers" will be needed each week in order to keep the program running. NO experience or special skills are required to help with Godly Play! All you need is a love of children and a willingness to offer 30 minutes of your worship time approximately once every 4-6 weeks (depending on the size of our volunteer core). Helping with children's ministry and building deeper relationships with these precious kiddos could not be easier, and I invite everyone to discern whether this might be an opportunity to serve God and Emmanuel in a new and fulfilling way. I promise, the gift of serving children is reciprocal.

If you are interested in volunteering, have any questions about Godly Play, or want to learn more, please do not hesitate to reach out – I would love the opportunity to chat with you!



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Welcome to the Table



Every Sunday we celebrate the mystical meal of communion with Christ. Our Sunday bulletin in italics welcomes all to come forward.

"All who seek God and are drawn to Christ are welcome to Holy Communion."

Baptism is the only formal requirement to receive communion in the Episcopal Church. "Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers? I will, with God's help." There is no minimum age. There are no required classes. There is no test to pass. At Baptism, you become a Christian. And once a Christian there is a seat for you at the table.

It has not always been so. Many of us grew up with a different tradition. Many Episcopalians remember waiting until after their confirmation. The Methodists among us may remember no waiting line. Everyone present, baptized or not, is invited to communion in the Methodist Church. Former Catholics remember waiting until they reached the "age of reason" (second grade) to receive their first communion. We Episcopalians practice the Via Media, steering a middle way through these cherished catholic and protestant traditions.

"So, when should my child receive communion?"

Here at Emmanuel, I frequently get asked this question. The time and age for children's first communion is the parents' prerogative. I believe, not just as a priest but as a mom, that long before children understand the readings or the homily, they understand gathering for a family meal. So, it makes sense that God also feeds us each Sunday with holy bread and holy wine,

But this family meal is different than dinner at home. The table is an "altar." The cup is a "chalice." The plate is a "paten." And Jesus is with us just as he was with his disciples as he was the Last Supper. The sacrament raises a lot of questions of who, what, when, where, and why. So, how do we best respond to our children's spiritual curiosity? How do we get ready for "first communion'? And this applies to children who already receiving as well.

Worship together as a family. Grab a children's bag with crayons at the back of the church. Choose a pew up front, where your kids have a good view of the action. Quietly step through the parts of the service with them: reading, prayers, homily, communion. Talk about it after church.

Read the story of the Last Supper together from the bible or a children's bible.

Sign up for Welcome to the Table: Holy Communion for Children: October 15 & 22. Designed for 5 to 10-year-olds, including those who already take communion, this two-part interactive Sunday morning class takes place between the services at 9:15 am in the Memorial Room. Led by Joani, each participant receives a copy of "This Bread and This Cup: Episcopal Communion Instruction for Children." On All Saints Sunday (November 5), children will come forward to receive communion with their families, be presented with a certificate, and recognized in the bulletin.

Remember "ready" is a relative word. The Eucharist is a mystical supper, an outward and visible sign of Christ's presence in this simple meal of bread and wine. If we waited until we fully understood, none of us would ever get to come to the table; and all would go hungry! So, whatever the Sunday, may we eat this bread and drink this cup as if every communion were our first.

Mindful Sketching isn't about making a pretty picture or accurate drawing. It is designed for meditation and relaxation. You'll feel like you've had a nap! December 3: A Very Musical Advent(ure)

On this Advent Sunday, we will gather to make a deep dive into this year's homegrown devotional and explore the musical mood of Advent. The four short weeks leading up to Christmas march to a different drummer than the Christmas carols to come. Advent is about expectation. The anticipation of both a vulnerable babe and a cosmic Christ. Advent's color is blue and the season's songs include soulful spirituals, rousing gospel, and tunes in a minor key. These songs — hidden in our hymnals — deserve a hearing this fleeting liturgical season.
