What do these pictures say to you?

Until I became a teacher, I thought accommodations referred to lodgings – as in room and board, or a hotel. I wasn't wrong, but there is another definition of the word accommodation that I was previously unfamiliar with: accommodation as an adjustment, or something that meets a need. It was this definition that became well-known to me as a teacher through the use of my students' IEPs, or Individualized Education Programs. An IEP is a written document for students with special needs that outlines their unique educational requirements and program of special educational instruction, supports, and services the students requires to make progress and thrive in school. These special instructions, supports, and services are collectively referred to as "accommodations" that allow a student to succeed and thrive in their learning environment.

By providing accommodations in an educational environment, teachers and administrators are creating an *inclusive* environment, simply meaning that they are creating a space in which every student can participate and thrive as their full self. After years of teaching, this concept of individualized learning, accommodations, and inclusivity became very personal to me when my daughter, Katie, was diagnosed as autistic. Katie just turned six years old and attends the Citywide Autism Program through the Alexandria City Public School System; she is essentially nonverbal (in that she does not utilize recognizable words in order to communicate her needs and wants), and her receptive language is at the function level of a two-year-old.

Katie has taught me so much about disability, life, the world, myself, and what inclusion looks like outside of educational environments. This new awareness quickly bled into my work and ministry at seminary. I quickly realized how broad the concept of inclusion truly is in the world at large, and how many people benefit from accommodations in their everyday lives.

In considering accommodation outside of an educational environment and in a worship setting, I began thinking about what accommodations might allow congregants to "participate and thrive as their full self." Accommodations could be something as simple as providing earplugs to ease the volume of the organ, offering magnifying pieces to aid with printed bulletins, or ensuring an elevator makes each level of the church building accessible to all. Accommodation could also look like providing sensory objects, or a quiet space where people can take a break.

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Since arriving at Emmanuel, I have been so inspired by your interpretation of radical, Christian hospitality, and believe worship accommodation is an organic branch of that welcoming spirit. The clergy and staff have gotten right on board with this idea, and it is on their behalf that I share a new idea and addition to Emmanuel's Worship Experience, "The Accommodation Station"! This station will consist of two baskets, located on the back pew of the nave – one containing earplugs and magnifying devices; the other, sensory-based items such as sunglasses, noise-cancelling headphones, and picture schedules for Holy Eucharist. In addition, my office will be offered during our worship services and special events as a "Quiet Space," where people experiencing sensory overload can recover.

But this idea does not end here! Let us hear from you, and your loved ones, about what accommodations might make your worship experience more personalized – something that might allow you to participate in worship more fully as your complete self. While you might think you are the only person that might benefit from X or Y, you would be surprised how many people might benefit from the same accommodation! New Communion Procedures: In case you missed this announcement in the e-news or Sunday bulletin

Our Diocesan Bishop, Rt. Rev. Mark Stevenson, has recently released a new customary (guidebook) on many processes, procedures, and practices. One of these new guidelines specifies how the wine may be received during the distribution of Holy Communion. You may recall, immediately following our return post-COVID, there was some scientific

discussion of the health implications of "sipping" versus "dipping" or intinction. Based on these findings, and perhaps additional factors, within the Diocese of Virginia, there has been a change to how intinction will now be offered. If you prefer the host to be "dipped" versus drinking from the cup, simply say "dip" to the clergy distributing Communion. The clergy will dip, or intinct, your host and place it in your hand. Worshippers may continue to drink directly from the cup if desired, or receive Communion in the single host form by returning to your seat once you have been given the host. In the Episcopal Church, reception in one form is considered to be in Full Communion with Christ. **This change began on All Saints Sunday, November 5.** Change can be challenging for us all. If you have any guestions, please do not hesitate to reach out to either Chuck or Joani.

"Advent is about *expectation*." The anticipation of both a vulnerable babe and a cosmic Christ. Advent's color is blue and the season's songs include soulful spirituals, rousing gospel, and tunes in a minor key. These songs — hidden in our



hymnals — deserve a hearing this fleeting liturgical season. This experiential guide includes 24 hymns, each accompanied by its opening verse. Click on the links to explore a rich treasure trove of info including representative lyrics (because lyrics vary), author, composer, tune, text, and more. Click on "Listen!" to do just that – listen to a contemporary performance of the hymn — be it ancient or modern. Each entry is also followed by a thumbnail sketch. 
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2023 Annual Stewardship Campaign

Every year, we rally to support our church financially through pledging. We think of ourselves as members of Emmanuel, but we don't pay membership "fees." We pledge, so that our Vestry can know how much to plan on when crafting the next year's budget.

In the past several years, we have successfully updated our facilities due to your generosity toward our Capital Campaign. We have replaced 4 aging HVAC units, waterproofed areas of the lower level to prevent further damage and mold, and replaced gutters to better manage water flow around the building. After discerning that we needed to revitalize services for our children, youth, and families we hired Jennie Leahey, our wonderful assistant rector for children and youth ministry. Emmanuel's leadership--clergy, staff, and Vestry--have ideas on how we can continue improving. Maybe you do, too! Talk to a vestry member if you have some thoughts that you want to share. A Day in the life of a 3 year-old at EPS!

Fall brings many wonderful things. Our favorite - a new school year filled with the infectious enthusiasm of our students. We always begin a new year learning our routines. Freezing and looking at our teacher when the bell rings, lining up, singing our song as we clean up, saying grace at snack and lunch. As 3s, everyone has a job every day. It helps to make us feel important and is great to share with our parents at the end of the day. This year we have three 3s classes. Below is a little blurb from each describing something their class has enjoyed.

Sky Blue 3's: The Sky Blue 3's have enjoyed and embraced the fall season and the exciting learning opportunities it offers. We began our fall adventures with a delicious apple tasting. The children had the opportunity to use all their sense to explore different types of apples. From sweet to sour, feel different textures, and observe their colors. It was a crunchy and juicy experience! To continue the fun and learning experience, our little ones rolled up their sleeves to be bakers. They used their fine motor skills to cut apples and enthusiastically mixed the ingredients. The kitchen was filled with the aroma of freshly baked pies that we couldn't resist eating. We also brough the outdoors inside with a fun leaf printing activity. The kids collected leaves of different colors and shapes. We used the leaves to create beautiful print. The excitement is building as we look forward to the holidays. We can't wait to explore the world of costumes and pumpkins and of course, express our gratitude during Thanksgiving.

Orange 3's: Every Orange 3 is a big fan of the fish tanks. Friends stop by to say hello command and going to school, on the way to music, time with Ms. Carmen, and it's the perfect place to take a quiet break for a few minutes. This has inspired "underwater projects" this fall. We decided to recreate our fish tank for our wall. We used water colors to paint the snails and fish, had fun with sponge rollers to make the water, and made the gravel bottom with a bubble wrap painting. We also spent a day "under the sea" in our classroom. We made a Friend-ship and a submarine out of large boxes, stacked seaweed towers (made from green plastic cups), listened to seashells, and hung our fish from the ceiling. The final touch was turning on our blue lights and playing whale sounds. Friends still ask to hear the whale sounds when they want to feel calm.

Purple 3's: The purple 3's have been having a blast getting to know our friends and teachers! We have had so much fun exploring apples and all that can be made with apples. We've sorted by color and size, we observed the texture and taste, we've counted and stamped to make paint prints, and even stacked them on our heads using paint dots on paper. The apple orchard & bakery sensory bin has been a huge hit as we use tweezers, spoons and measuring cups to scoop, mix, and create some yummy apple treats. We are using fine motor skills to make beaded bracelets and we even used scissors and glue to complete projects. We've enjoyed reading lots of great books like Apple Farmer Annie and Ten Apples Up on Top and we've even sung along to some apple songs! We sure are busy in the purple 3 room and we can't wait for more Fall fun ahead!
